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Preface

The University of Wisconsin–Madison Libraries’ Honoring the Faculty program recognizes faculty members who receive promotion by adding a book to the library collection in their name. Newly promoted faculty members are invited to choose a book for the library collection and a commemorative bookplate is placed in each book.

Promotion in rank is rightly viewed as a major achievement in the professional life of a faculty member. It is the culmination of years of work, representing excellence in research, teaching, and service to the university and the wider community. The libraries were inspired to initiate this program because the library staff has had many occasions to witness and admire the extraordinary talent, energy, and effort required to achieve promotion and tenure at the University of Wisconsin–Madison.

Faculty members were encouraged to select a book title representing something meaningful to them either professionally or personally. Titles could include anything from books that informed their thinking or research, to books they authored or co-authored, to books that inspired them as children. Promoted faculty were asked to fill out a brief form providing information about their book and why they recommended it. They were also given the option of having a library selector choose a book for them in a specific subject area. Each bookplate provides the faculty member’s name, department, and year of promotion.

The books added to the collection are paid for through the unrestricted gift and endowment funds of the UW–Madison Libraries. The depth and excellence of library collections—enriched by programs such as this one—would not be possible without the generosity of donors.

Every effort has been made with this publication to ensure that no one is overlooked. However it is possible for promotions to be made after the spring announcement. If this occurs, the faculty member will be recognized in the following year.

I wish to acknowledge the important contributions of Elisabeth Owens, who managed Honoring the Faculty from its inception, and Richard Reeb, who provided essential oversight of the process for acquiring and processing the honorees’ books. The books selected provide a reminder of the attainments of each UW–Madison faculty member and the compilation will serve as an ongoing archival record of the University of Wisconsin–Madison’s institutional history.

I am very interested in the Victorian era because it was a time of excitement. It was the age of travel, exploration, scientific discovery, and the dawning of photography. Both adults and children were introduced to the natural world through a large number of educational publications in which various species of wildlife from insects to elephants were anthropomorphized so as to have greater appeal to the general reading public. Voracious collecting of all manner of plants and wildlife was extremely popular at that time. In my mind, the elephant's foot umbrella stand is the quintessential object that defines the era, for it is exotic yet grotesque. For the insatiable Victorian collector nothing was sacrosanct. These collections were often presented in cabinets of curiosity or arrangements that had little to do with genus but everything with aesthetic presentation. They were quirky, and that is the spirit I attempt to channel in my own art practice.

The Origins of Genome Architecture.

With official genomic blueprints now available for hundreds of species, and thousands more expected in the near future, the field of biology has been forever transformed. Such readily accessible data have encouraged the proliferation of adaptive arguments for the evolution of gene and genomic features, often with little or no attention being given to simpler and more powerful alternative explanations. By integrating the central observations from molecular biology and population genetics relevant to comparative genomics, Lynch shows why the details matter. Presented in a nontechnical fashion, at both the population-genetic and molecular-genetic levels, this book offers a unifying explanatory framework for how the peculiar architectural diversity of eukaryotic genomes and genes came to arise. Under Lynch’s hypothesis, the genome-wide repatterning of eukaryotic gene structure, which resulted primarily from nonadaptive processes, provided an entirely novel resource from which natural selection could secondarily build new forms of organismal complexity.
